negative stereotypes you've read about autistic individuals. But I'm here to tell you that my life would have no meaning...no depth...no purpose if it wasn't for autism. And my adult son with Asperger's Syndrome, is THE most amazing, clever, smart, funny, adorable hero I've ever encountered. It's a privilege to be his mom.



I wasn't afraid of the autism diagnosis but I must tell you that my son wasn't diagnosed until he was 13. I knew intuitively when he was two, but no medical professional or therapist ever mentioned or discussed it as a possible explanation for his developmental and social issues. So when he was officially diagnosed, we were already doing what needed to be done to help him grow to his best potential.

You are a warrior parent! I know it because only warrior parents are blessed with special needs children and here's what you'll be able to do to help your child thrive:

You'll become a **foot soldier** with your eyes and ears constantly on the ground to clear your child's path and scout for individuals and organizations who can join your ranks of support. You'll be a covered wagon, **pioneer** blazing a trail into the unknown to create a better life for your child. You'll don your virtual business suit and become **Parent**, **CEO** to pitch for services and make sure everyone works together on the business of building your child's self-confidence and skill set. You'll be **Dorothy**, **Lion, Tin Man, Scarecrow** and the **Wizard of Oz** combined, using all of your powers, influences, creativity, fast-thinking, courage and heart so your child can (and will) thrive.

I've played all of these characters and taken on even more alter-egos from Sherlock to Iron Man—whomever my son needs me to be at any given point in time. Today, he's 29 years old and living independently and working as a professional voice actor. Does he still struggle and need more attention and support than my neurotypical 25 year old daughter? Yes, but every day I see him needing just a little less of my oversight and I just get to sit back and enjoy the incredible man he has become.

So my fellow autism warrior friend, have your moment of sadness and then let go of your pre-determined expectations of your child and set forth on the magical mystery tour of autism. Get ready to cast yourself in whatever roles necessary to be your child's guardian angel and life's coach. You can do it!

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### MY GOLDEN RULES OF AUTISM PARENTING

I've been an autism parent for almost 30 years. Throughout his growing up, my priority was always focused on my son's well-being—choosing the services, schools, community activities, and professionals who could help him thrive. Here are the 8 parenting rules I live by:

# ALWAYS TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS

I learned to trust my instincts especially when it came to therapies or professional opinions. I have the utmost respect for the medical community but if something didn't 'feel right,' I respectfully declined a recommendation. I came to understand that no one really had the depth of knowledge and understanding that I had about my son so I trusted my instincts first before setting on a course of action.

Unconditional love gives you the strength to go out in the world and take risks because you know that family has your back and will be there with you every step of the way, no matter what. But self-esteem comes from personal achievement...you can praise and pass out certificates and stickers and clap and give your undivided attention, but you cannot "give" someone confidence.





I am hyper-aware and listen for anything my son talks about as a clue for finding something (anything) he is interested in where his involvement could result in personal achievement. Notice the "could." No matter what I find, there is a risk that he'll get frustrated, feel like a failure and want to give up too soon. But I take that risk, so he has many opportunities for success.



I am always on the lookout for opportunities for him to share his talents and abilities. I have witnessed time and time again the power that comes from his being able to contribute...and I mean REALLY contribute using his own skill set. Self-confidence just oozes from his pores! And this empowers him in other areas of his life.



I don't compare him to any of his peers. I don't 'expect' him to be on the same path as anybody else. He's on his own life's timetable, and that's perfect. I don't pressure him to reach certain milestones—only encourage him to engage in his life and not isolate himself because he's afraid to fail.

## TAKE THE INITIATIVE OF AN ENTREPRENEUR



I'm not much of a risk-taker myself, but when it comes to my son—I'm fearless! I'll do whatever it takes so he can flourish even going way outside my comfort zone and start a company if need be.

# LIVE IN POSSIBILITY NOT DISABILITY






I adore this book! I laughed, I cried, and finished with a new understanding and insights into my son's world through John Robison's own personal life story.
